Safety Policy

Definitions

Event

 Miniature Horse Events including but not limited to, Shows, Fun Days, Measuring Days, Exhibitions and any other "event" involving Miniature Horses

Discipline

 A section of an event (eg. at shows - Halter, Harness, Obstacle & Jumping are four distinct "Disciplines")

Exhibitor NZMHA Any competitor, handler, exhibitor or active participant at an Event

 New Zealand Miniature Horse Association, Affiliated Clubs, NZMHA Council and any employees (including volunteers and contracted personnel) working on behalf of "NZMHA"

Event Management • General Public • Unsafe Behaviour •

Any person involved in the running of an Event be they paid or volunteer

Any person who is not an member of Event Management or an Exhibitor

 Any behaviour on the part of the Miniature Horse or Exhibitor that is deemed to put any Miniature Horse, Exhibitor, member of NZMHA, member of Event Management or General Public at risk

Purpose

The purpose of this document is to record NZMHA's policies for the safe running of Miniature Horse related *Events* (eg. shows) and to document the procedures.

Policy Statement

Horses are and will remain unpredictable animals and it is impossible to anticipate their every reaction to stimuli. As far as is reasonably possible due care and consideration will be taken in regards to safety in order to protect Miniature Horses, *Exhibitors*, *NZMHA*, *Event Management*, the *General Public* and the property of the aforementioned.

NZMHA will accept no responsibility for any accident or other event that gives rise to damage, or loss to horse, vehicles or other property; or to death, injury, or illness (including mental anguish) to any person whether an *Exhibitor*, member, of the *General Public* or *Event Management* or otherwise, whilst participating at or attending an *Event*;

Responsibilities

- NZMHA will ensure that the NZMHA Show Rules facilitate the holding of a range of classes in a variety of Disciplines at Events that as far as is reasonably practicable minimise the risk to the Miniature Horses, Exhibitors, Event Management and the General Public;
- Event Management must act, as is reasonably practicable, in such a way as to be minimise the risk to all.
 - Provision of safe equipment for use at Events,
 - Safe arrangements for the use, handling, storage, transportation and installation of equipment,
 - The provision of all necessary instructions, training and supervision to ensure the health and safety of all members of the *Event Management* team and *Exhibitors*,
 - The provision of a safe environment for spectators and members of the general public (ie. non Event Management or Exhibitors);

 Exhibitors must supervise and control their Miniature Horses at all times and shall be liable for any hazards created or accidents, illness or damage caused by the action or inaction of themselves or their Miniature Horses at any Event. Exhibitors must comply with the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 and any subsequent revisions to this Act;

Risk/Hazard/Incident Management

The following steps will be taken whenever the majority of *Event Management* deem a Miniature Horse or *Exhibitor* has demonstrated *Unsafe Behaviour* regardless as to whether damage or injury occurred;

- The Event will be halted and the Exhibitor will be required to remove themselves and their Miniature
 Horse from the staging area of the Event (eg. show ring, Event building etc.). The Miniature Horse or
 Exhibitor (dependent on which has been deemed to be guilty of Unsafe Behaviour) will be ineligible to
 compete in any other part of the Discipline at the Event (eg. Unsafe Behaviour in a Harness class will
 result in the Miniature Horse or Exhibitor being unable to compete in any other Harness classes at the
 Event);
 - If *Event Management* deem the situation to be serious enough to warrant such action the *Exhibitor* can be required to remove themselves and their Miniature Horse from the *Event* thereby foregoing any right to participate further in the *Event* (eg. the Miniature Horse or *Exhibitor* will not be able to compete in any other classes at the show);
- 2. Event Management will file a formal written incident report to NZMHA Council within seven (7) days including details of the Unsafe Behaviour, the name of the Miniature Horse, the name of the Exhibitor, the action taken, any damage/injury caused and their recommendations as to any further action. This report must be signed by those members of the Event Management who made the decision;
- 3. Event Management will confirm their actions in writing to the Exhibitor within seven (7) days including details of the Unsafe Behaviour, the name of the Miniature Horse, the name of the Exhibitor, the action taken and any damage/injury caused;
- 4. NZMHA Council will investigate the incident to confirm that Unsafe Behaviour was demonstrated and will determine at its discretion whether any further action against the Miniature Horse or Exhibitor is warranted. NZMHA Council will notify the Exhibitor as to the outcome of its investigations within thirty days of the incident.

Stand Down Periods

The following stand down periods are mandatory:

- Any Miniature Horse or Exhibitor that demonstrates Unsafe Behaviour twice in the same Discipline at Events within the same season (April 1 to 31 March inclusive) will be suspended from being able to participate in that Discipline at any Event until the next season
- Any Miniature Horse or Exhibitor that demonstrates Unsafe Behaviour at four Events regardless of the Discipline within the same season (April 1 to 31 March inclusive) will be suspended from being able to attend any Event until the next season

Repetitive Unsafe Behaviour

Any Unsafe Behaviour that results in the same Miniature Horse or Exhibitor being suspended in two consecutive seasons will result in the Miniature Horse or Exhibitor being permanently excluded from participating in the Discipline or Events (eg. if a harness horse demonstrates Unsafe Behaviour on two occasions in two consequtive show seasons (ie. a total of four incidents across two years) it will be ineligible to compete in harness classes again)
